



About the Preserve

For dramatic coastal scenery in Harpswell, nothing beats the Giant's Stairs. Named for its interesting geologic history, the Giant's Stairs trail follows the rocky coastline with gorgeous views of eastern Casco Bay, often with crashing waves glinting in the sunlight. On any given day you might see rafts of ducks, foraging harbor seals or a lobster boat hauling traps below your feet. The Giant's Stairs Trail is managed by the Town of Harpswell, while Harpswell Heritage Land Trust's McIntosh Lot Preserve Trail completes the short and easy loop.

The rock formations here are a geologist's dream, but even a layman can appreciate the gigantic forces that shaped this coastline going back 500 million years. Layers of mud formed the original sedimentary rock, along with deposits of minerals that later crystallized into quartz and garnet. Movements in the Earth's crust caused massive buckling and cracking. Hot magma flowed into one large crack and formed a vertical seam of dark basalt rock. Erosion of the basalt during 200 million years led to what now looks like a Giant's Stairs.
